

Paediatric Critical Care Levels 1 & 2 Course

Course Overview

The module is delivered by The Faculty of Children's Nurse Education in conjunction with the Paediatric Critical Care Society (PCCS), working closely to ensure the module meets the quality standards it sets in working towards a nationally recognised qualification in nursing the critically ill child. Commonly defined as high dependency care in the Time to Move on Document (2014) and more recently referred to as Level 1 and 2 critical care in the PCCS Standards (2021).

This course will facilitate the development of the practitioners' knowledge and skills in the core elements of paediatric critical care. Practitioners will consolidate their knowledge of anatomy and physiology and the interventions required to care safely for a child and young person requiring Level 1- and level 2 using current research/evidence to underpin their practice. The principles of holistic, family centred care will run throughout the module.

For those candidates who attend the course who are not registered paediatric nurses it may still be possible to gain accreditation through PCCS. Discuss with the Faculty.

Module aims are to facilitate the personal and professional development of the Registered Nurse within the speciality of Critical Care Level 1 & 2, or High Dependency Care. Learning outcomes include developing an analytical and critical approach to the concepts and evidence based practice within paediatric nursing.

The intention is that successful completion of your studies will enhance your ability to safely and competently care for infants, children and young people with a wide range of health issues requiring a high level of basic and enhanced critical care.

Content

This module will enable practitioners to develop their existing knowledge and skills in the management of children requiring high dependency care by increasing their critical understanding and application of current research and specialised practice.

The module content is built upon the student's experience of caring for children and young people in various environments such as: paediatric wards, paediatric High Dependency Units, Emergency Department and Adult Intensive Therapy Units areas which require Registered Nurses to care for the critically ill child for short periods of time. Topics will include:

- Anatomy and physiology of the major organ systems
- Systematic assessment of the child and young person requiring basic and/or enhanced critical care
- Principles of support for the child or young person requiring Level 1 and 2 care
- Demonstration of a comprehensive knowledge base, analysis, synthesis, evaluation and application of evidence from a range of sources including practice.
- Consolidation of essential skills in the utilisation and analysis of literature to underpin actions and decision making.
- Specialist nursing in contemporary healthcare: leadership, advocacy, change management, government drivers affecting the NHS

Aims

To develop further the specialised knowledge and skills of practitioners in relation to the delivery and management of high dependency care for children and their families.

Assessed Learning Outcomes

- 1. Assess, plan, implement and evaluate interventions in high dependency situations to ensure safe and appropriate care.
- 2. Support and empower sick children and their families utilising professional expertise of self and the multi-disciplinary team, including advising, counselling and psychological support.
- 3. Deliver holistic care which recognises ethical and legal issues.
- 4. Contribute to an environment in which high dependency care is developed using an evidencebased philosophy.
